TO DO IN JUNE



TREES AND SHRUBS

- Carefully snip off the dead heads of azaleas and rhododendrons after flowering.
- Cut back broom when it has flowered.
- Reduce long shoots of climbing plants.
- Towards the end of the month, trim box-topiary.
- Feed roses and deadhead regularly to encourage more blooms.
- Prune plum trees in June or July when growing strongly.

FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

- Separate and plant strawberry runners.
- Thin out any developing fruit on fruit trees after the June drop.
- Fertilize vegetables as necessary and keep them watered, mulched and weed-free.
- Plant any vegetables outdoors that were pregrown in the greenhouse.
- Tie up tomatoes and pinch-out side shoots regularly.
- Harvest herbs and early potatoes.

FLOWERING PLANTS

- Plant the last of the annuals.
- Stake tall-growing varieties to prevent them from being flattened by wind and rain.
- Pull out weeds, hoe and mulch the beds.
- Cut back early flowering species, such as delphiniums, to a hand's height above soil level (they will flower again in late summer).

HEDGES

- Many types of hedges can be given their first clipping of the season, which will help them keep their shape and stimulate fresh growth.
- Older hedges may need just a small trim, but young, actively growing hedges should be given a substantial prune.
- To keep the top of hedges flat and even, try using a length of string as a guide.
- Don't forget to weed under your hedges at this time of year. After weeding, add a layer of mulch to reduce the chance of any weeds from reappearing.

LAWNS

- It may be necessary to mow twice a week now. If rainfall is low then water the lawn thoroughly, but not frequently, to encourage deep root growth
- If weeds are still prevalent, apply a lawn weed treatment when the soil is moist.
- If clover exists then rake the lawn before mowing.
- If you plan to mow a wildflower meadow twice a year, carry out the first mow in mid-June.



Senetti should be treated as an annual. If regularly deadheaded, it will bloom all summer long!
